Greetings:

It is a pleasure to welcome you to the 2019 VCU Division for Health Sciences Diversity Annual Report. Our Health Sciences Pipeline provides students from various backgrounds, particularly those who identify as underrepresented minorities and/or from medically under-served communities, with the resources they need to advance both academically and professionally as aspiring health care providers. In doing so, we interact with participants all along the educational spectrum ranging from middle and high school students to college and post-baccalaureate students. By incorporating several programming standards, which we refer to as our "Pipeline Pillars," we do our best to ensure that the services we offer promote: health care career exploration/health care experiences, academic support initiatives, pre-enrollment/pre-matriculation preparation, community engagement, and social and professional networking.

This academic-year marked several milestones in enrollment for Pipeline Programs participants, as we witnessed a dramatic increase in the number of first-time matriculants overall with a surge in the number of incoming Summer Academic Enrichment Program (SAEP) participants who enrolled at VCU this past fall. I am also particularly proud of the amount of Pipeline participants who earned health professions degrees in 2019 as well. Specifically, programs such as Health Sciences Academy, SAEP, and VCU Acceleration each saw substantial improvements in this area.

In acknowledging these accomplishments, I attribute our success to the efforts and collaborative spirit of our community partners along with VCU faculty and staff on the Monroe Park and MCV campuses. For without their invaluable expertise, commitment, and willingness to leverage their resources, our division would not be able to captivate our participants' career interests in such a meaningful way or supply them with the academic resources they so desperately need for advancement in the health sciences.

DHSD is now positioned to serve as a national model for pipeline programming strategies specifically geared toward improving participation for underrepresented minority students in STEM-H disciplines, which includes design, implementation, and building capacity to establish cross-institutional and community partnerships where resources are shared for optimal efficiency and greater scalability of impact.

OUR MISSION

The Division for Health Sciences Diversity (DHSD) is strategically positioned within the Offce of the Vice President for Health Sciences to create programs that diversify the pool of applicants to VCU's health sciences professional programs.

We are committed to assisting underrepresented minority students (i.e., racial/ethnic minorities, low socioeconomic status, first-generation, rural, medically under-served communities, etc.) in their interest to pursue careers related to the health sciences.

By offering a vast array of Pipeline programs, we intend to:

- encourage students to explore career opportunities within the profession of health care,
- provide students with access to academic and social resources that contribute to their success in preparation for health professions/graduate school admissions.
- and connect students with a network of health care providers and community partners who support our mission.

The mission of VCU's **Division for Health Sciences Diversity** is to diversify the health care workforce through pipeline programs and initiatives.



OUR PROGRAMS

HEALTH SCIENCES ACADEMY

Health Sciences Academy (HSA) helps high school students from Cosby High School's Health Sciences Specialty Center, Richmond Community High School, and John Marshall High School make informed choices about the health professions they wish to pursue. HSA offers a health sciences exploration course to students at. The course includes interactive lectures from health care workers, a mentoring program with VCU undergraduates and feld trips to the Monroe Park and VCU Health campuses. Participants also receive college credit.

ALLIED HEALTH CAREER EXPLORATION

Allied Health Career Exploration (AHCE) is a program designed to expose recent high school graduates, college freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors to the 9 schools within the VCU College of Health Professions. Participants explore the admissions process, participate in hands-on and interactive activities within each discipline, workshops on current health care topics, interviewing skills, resume development and more. AHCE participants receive the necessary information to pursue a School of Allied health Professions application process.

VCU ACCELERATION

VCU Acceleration is a 4-week residential summer program and a year-long living learning community offered to incoming VCU freshmen. The program begins with a summer pre-matriculation session that includes an introduction to college level math and science courses and exposure to health sciences school at VCU. Additionally, the first academic year continues with a living-learning community which supports high levels of student interaction, increased interaction with faculty outside of the classroom, and collaboration through shared classes, study groups, and programming

SUMMER ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

The Summer Academic Enrichment Program (SAEP) is a 6-week residential intensive inter-professional academic enrichment program. SAEP is designed to prepare undergraduate, junior and senior and post-baccalaureate students interested in health sciences, for admission into health professional programs. The primary focus of SAEP is to provide students withan academically rigorous experience that simulates the frst year of health professional school. This is done through graduate level course work, interprofessional education, community engagement, and skill building.





States where former HSA participants were enrolled in Fall 2019




48.3% of HSA participants were enrolled in a health professions or health sciences-related program.





Allied Health Career Exploration - Enrollment







VCU Acceleration – Enrollment









RAM CLINIC

Each year, SAEP Participants return to volunteer at the Remote Access Medical (RAM) Clinic in Emporia, Virginia. This year, student's were able to be involved in Triage, Foot Checks, Translating, Dental Assisting and many more. Participants were certified with their Bloodborne Pathogen Certification before starting their assignments.

This full day experience offered a students an opportunity to practice skills they had performed during Health Check as well as a first hand view of lecture topics on health disparities. Many of the patients seen at RAM Clinic were from a medically under-served population with minimal access to affordable health care. The students used this experience as inspiration to become better clinicians as they venture into professional schools.

HEALTH CHECK

This year, the Summer Academic Enrichment Program's Health Check returned to St. Paul's Episcopal Church and saw 86 underserved patients in Richmond's City Center. This population consists of homeless or working poor individuals that often have little or no access to adequate healthcare. SAEP's Health Check gives patients the opportunity to receive treatment for various foot ailments and request physician referrals* to local clinics or VCU's Health System. The clinic also provides patients with oral health screenings facilitated by VCU's School of Dentistry. Patients seen are given health education materials on smoking cessation, cardiac health, and diabetes. In addition to patient care and education materials, patients are offered a pair of gently used walking shoes, cleaning and grooming materials for their feet, a clean pair of socks, and a dental care kit

In preparation for Health Check, several hours were spent educating students on the proper methods of cleaning and grooming feet, conducting a diabetic foot exam and measuring a patient's blood pressure and sugar by the use of a stethoscope, sphygmomanometer, glucometer, and lancet by Graduate students and faculty members from VCU's Schools of Medicine and Pharmacy, and Physical Therapy Department.




